Obs. Single fornication they count no sin, but after Mariage (which they solemnize by content of Parents and publique approbation publicuely) then they count it hainous for either of them to be false.

Mammaûsu.		<i>An adulterer.</i>
Nummam mógwûn- ewò		<i>He hath wronged my bed.</i>
Pallè nochisquaûaw.		<i>He or She hath com- mitted adultery.</i>

Obs. In this case the wronged party may put away or keepe the party offending: commonly, if the Woman be false, the offended Husband will be solemnely revenged upon
