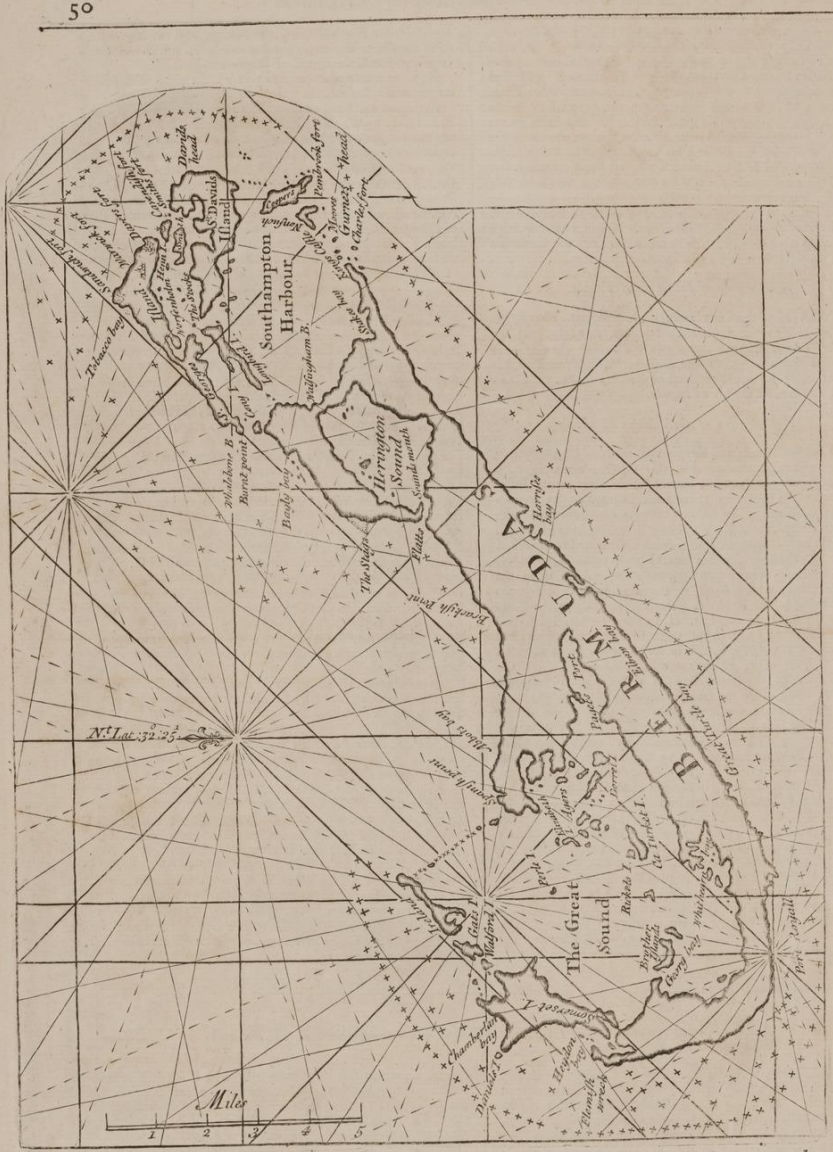




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A Description of the Ports and Islands upon the Coast between the Amazonas and Cape Florida.

Note, If you come upon the Spanish Coast, between April and Sep. or Oct. you will seldom miss of a Westerly Wind, and an Easterly Current: In the Winter Months the Winds are commonly between the N. and E. and the Current very uncertain.

A Description of the Coast of Guiana, from the River of Amazonas, to the River of Oronoque, and Island of Trinidad.

WHEN you are bound for the W. Indies, or Coast of Guiana, and taking your Departure from the Lizard, bound for the said Coast, first shape your Course for the Canary Islands, which lie in the Lat. of 28 deg. 30 min. SW. till you come

into the Lat. of 43 Degrees, sailing or keeping about 60 or 70 Leagues without Cape Finister, which lieth in that Latitude, and from thence steer away S. by W. which Course will carry you without the Island Madera, lying in the Lat. of 31 deg. 20 min. then steer away SW. by S. somewhat Westerly, which will carry you clear, and without all the said Islands.

And now Note, That about the Latitude of these Islands you begin to have the North East or Trade Winds; but you will find that at some Times of the Year, more than at others, they differ somewhat in going sometimes farther one Way, sometimes farther the other; and the farther Northerly you are, the more variable you find them to be.
